Okinawa International University was established in February 25, 1972 (Showa 47), right before Okinawa was returned to Japan, as a university founded on the spirit of "Striving for Autonomy and True Freedom." Our educational vision is "Valuing nature and traditional Okinawan culture and creating scholarly culture that supports the peace and coexistence of humankind, as well as cultivating people who are rich in spirit and full of personality who will contribute to the development of international society and the independence of the region." The key phrases describing this vision are "peace and coexistence," "personality and coexistence," and "personality and development." In order to contribute to the development of Okinawa, we aim to train professionals who will become the bankokushinryou no sakigake, or the pioneers and bridges between nations, using Okinawa's potential as a crossroads in Asia. The mission of the university is to conduct research and regional collaboration that demonstrates the individuality of Okinawa. In addition, as the regional leader, we will work to create a workforce that can travel throughout the world and proactively engage in further international exchange and regional collaboration.

Okinawa has been endowed with a warm, natural environment that belongs to the subtropical zone, and has developed through building a unique culture that has been historically affected by various foreign countries. In recent years, the number of international tourists including those from China, Taiwan, and Korea, has increased due to the expansion of international air routes and port calls from cruise ships, and initiatives are in motion to make Okinawa a logistics base for Southeast Asia and developing China.

Our university is comprised of ten departments and four faculties that specialize in social sciences and humanities, and a graduate school that has three research departments. We have students not only from Okinawa and other prefectures but also exchange students. They learn not only specialized courses, but also about Okinawan history, culture, language and US military base issues. Our university also has a study abroad program with national and international partner universities, and students are able to make use of our complete scholarship program. The university will work to further enhance a learning environment where students feel at ease and are able to acquire advanced and refined knowledge. In addition, we are making efforts in job-hunting support, with approximately 50,000 of our graduates in Okinawa and in other prefectures working in finance, logistics, welfare, and a variety of other fields, including civil servants and teachers, as well as talent working overseas.

Along with imparting our students with a wide range of knowledge, our university is a higher educational institution that maintains the mission to train promising and specialized human resources needed by the country, society and region. Hard Work that Makes Your Dream Come True



As part of the only college of law in Okinawa, we provide a systematic and broad-based study of law in over to produce talented professionals capable of being active in society by

The Department of Law provides a broad-based study of law from the fundamentals to the practical. The department helps our students develop a sense of law by offering various kinds of subjects. The knowledge encompasses a variety of areas, from work-related topics such as working hours and wages, to family-related topics including family relationships and taxes. Theory of Legal Practice is a unique class in which individuals from various occupations lecture on legal issues relating to the workplace. This is a popular class that increases students' awareness of employment possibilities, and helps them decide their future careers. We also have a seminar in which students can experience the lay judge system at a mock court.

Rediscover the cultures of Ryukyu and Japan, and share them with the world

Students in the Department of Japanese Language and Culture study a wide range of cultural topics related to Okinawa and Japan, including language, literature, and performing arts. Students also improve various skills such as information technology (IT) skills, the ability to understand local communities, and foreign-language communication skills needed to share Okinawan and Japanese culture with the globalized world of today. In addition, with the goal of becoming language professionals, students undergo repeated training to acquire an enriched education, and to master expressive language skills and self-actualization in order to become self-reliant professionals and community residents who are active in society.

We support students to engage in a broad-based, in-depth study of the cultures of Okinawa/Ryukyu and Japan, and to learn the knowledge, skills, and sensibility needed to share and express them with the globalized world by

- having students examine language, literature, and performing arts rooted in Okinawa and Japan;
- fostering the ability to research, read, critique, write, and express ideas through intensive individual instruction in small-group seminars;
- offering seminars and guidance in written expression at the Writing Center;
- enhancing first-year education (such as membership training, original guidebooks, and career guidance);
- providing instruction from reputable, established junior and senior high school Japanese language teachers;
- offering instruction from Japanese-language teachers who address the era of harmony between internationalization and multiculturalism; and
- establishing the only expert seminars on library science in the prefecture that offer expert training on becoming a librarian.

Department Characteristics

At the Department of Japanese Language and Culture, not only do students deepen their knowledge of Japanese language and literature, but they can also specialize in studying the unique languages native to the Okinawa/Ryukyu islands, as well as Ryukyu literature and performing arts. Though currently there are few opportunities to study Okinawa/Ryukyu in high school, this department focuses directly on the culture of the region. The Japanese Language Teacher's License Course, Japanese as a Second Language Teacher Training Course, and Library Science Training Course are comprehensive, and students can acquire licenses and qualifications as they experience Japanese culture and Ryukyu/Okinawan culture, while also obtaining an awareness of international communication.

Society and Regional Culture

Build your career as a global leader on a solid foundation of Okinawa and **Est Asian studies**

How much do you know about Okinawa? Okinawa Prefecture is located in the center of the Ryukyu Archipelago, a group of small islands in the southwestern corner of Japan. Although located in the periphery of the Japanese Archipelago, the centralized location in relation to many East Asia countries allows it to have a disproportionate geopolitical importance. Thus, Okinawa offers an excellent vantage point from which to analyze the nations of East Asia. Students at the OKIU Department of Society and Regional Culture pursue their studies in an interdisciplinary environment, acquiring insight into the history, society, and culture of Okinawa through rigorous comparative analysis. Incorporating holistic perspectives, and putting special focus on the context of dynamic relations between the countries of East Asia, OKIU graduates develop both the broad perspectives, and the in-depth analytical skills needed to become regional and global leaders in Okinawa, Japan, and beyond.

This department takes a comprehensive approach to learning about Okinawa that explores the past, present and future of these islands placed in a broader perspective of Asia and the world by

- cultivating specialists in Okinawan society and culture;
- conducting fieldwork which stresses learning on-location;
- acquiring extensive knowledge of the intricate workings of human society and culture;
- developing international perspectives informed by Okinawan and East Asian outlooks:
- fostering practical English language proficiency to meet the demands of our globalized society; and
- enhancing small-group education through four-year seminar programs, and facilitating the ability to discover, analyze, and resolve socio-cultural issues.

Incorporating the above guiding principles, the OKIU Department of Society and Regional Culture offers students the following seminar programs:

- ▶ Archeology and Prehistory Seminar: Students learn about the people and history of the Ryukyu Islands as revealed through excavations.
- ▶ Early Modern History Seminar: Students learn about history focusing on the culture and society of the people of the Ryukyu Kingdom.
- ▶ Modern History Seminar: Students learn about modern Okinawan history from a variety of perspectives.
- ▶ Folklore Seminar: Students learn about the folklore of old Okinawa which still lives on today.
- ▶ Anthropology Seminar: Students learn about Okinawan society and culture through comparative studies with Asia and other parts of the world
- ▶ Sociology Seminar: Students learn about social systems, and learn to analyze current socio-cultural issues in Okinawa.
- ▶ Peace Studies Seminar: With Okinawa as a starting point, students learn both how to conceptualize peace, and how to construct and maintain peace.





Department Characteristics

The Department of Society and Regional Culture takes a distinctive interdisciplinary approach to the study of history, society and culture. Students are encouraged to reflect upon their interdisciplinary knowledge to elicit new connections and insight, and to apply such insight to real-world situations. Our students are taught the value and importance of utilizing primary sources of information, Fieldwork is emphasized in all of our seminars in order to deepen understanding and awareness of issues involving various aspects of Okinawa. For example, students learn about peace from people who survived the war, learn about prehistoric Okinawa by participating in excavations, and learn about Okinawan culture and society by interviewing people directly involved in cultural and social activities. This grounded, empirical approach develops a talent for problem solving which is currently in demand in various related fields including politics, economics and education. The curriculum of the Department of Society and Regional Culture aims to prepare students for leadership roles in Okinawa, Japan, Asia, and on the world stage.

The Counseling Major in the Department of Human Welfare offers a broad-based study of how the human mind works from various perspectives. Throughout the 4 years, students closely examine the psychological perspective—the emotions of people who possess many different ways of thinking. The department fosters an approach of collective thinking that scientifically grasps the invisible phenomena of the mind.

We teach students to be attuned to what is occurring in society and in people's minds, and to refine their comprehension, behavior, and intellectual senses by

- fostering professionals in psychology and welfare-related fields;
- offering comprehensive education that incorporates emphasis on practical training including psychological examinations, psychological experiments, and clinical interviews;
- · actively supporting the acquisition of relevant qualifications;
- conducting practical training entrenched in the community; and
- actively addressing lifelong learning and adult students.

Department Characteristics

The course is advantageous not only for hands-on studies in clinical psychology and counseling, but also for practical studies in basic areas of psychology such as statistics, research methods, and basic experiments. Students have strong cross-departmental ties and energetically take the initiative to participate in the planning and management of various events, including open campus and a sports competition to welcome new students. After graduation, some students take jobs in private companies, while others go on to graduate school to become clinical psychologists. The students are enthusiastic about being involved with people and society through their study of psychology.

Graduate School

Graduate School of

Regional Culture

Philosophy / Aims:

The Graduate School of Regional Culture targets education and research of culture in the southern islands and the larger world and aims to contribute to the advancement of local residents through that research on regional cultures. Based on this university's philosophy, the school values the traditions, culture, and natural environment of Okinawa, creates scholarship and culture that support the peace and coexistence of humankind, and cultivates spiritually rich, unique individuals to contribute to local autonomy and the development of international society.

Research on the culture of the southern islands clarifies dissemination routes of Asian culture and processes of change. Those research outcomes can contribute not only to understanding of the southern island region, but also of culture and society in Japan and the world. Together with an accurate understanding of culture, the research helps international exchange with countries neighboring Okinawa and Japan, thus contributing to the formation of a society that is energized and peaceful.

Department of Ryukyuan Culture

Language and Culture

The area of Language and Culture focuses on language and literature in the southern island region, and researches Japan's classical literature, modern literature, and language education. The major objectives are acquisition of advanced licenses and qualifications, and the further education of officials and the general public.

Folk Culture

The area of Folk Culture also focuses on researching the southern island region, but in content emphasizes the relationship with surrounding regions, such as East Asia and Southeast Asia. The curriculum and lecture content delve deeply into folk culture in the southern islands and its spread to surrounding regions.

Prehistory / History and Culture

Archeology, one of the pillars of Prehistory / History and Culture, researches prehistoric culture in the southern island region, and focuses on comparative studies with surrounding regions such as East Asia and Southeast Asia. Southern Island History, another pillar, is divided into Modern History and Contemporary History. Modern History focuses on reading ancient manuscripts and deepens understanding of the history of the southern islands.

Society and Culture

The area of Society and Culture covers the attributes of the southern island region with a focus on sociology and cultural issues as mechanisms for perpetuating social structures. This area includes the basic structure of southern island society, human generation, and aspects of processing real-society problems.

Department of British and American Studies

British and American Literature

The area of British and American Literature studies literature, poems, and plays. It also offers subjects on British and American culture that center on the language of English.

Language Education

The area of Language Education studies English language education and Japanese as a second language education based on the relationships among language, culture, education, and society. It also offers the opportunity to consider language education from practical and diverse perspectives, including practical training in language education and multilingual education.

Department of Human Welfare

Social Welfare

The area of Social Welfare explores specialized theories related to social welfare and clarifies actual conditions involving various problems in regional society and facilities using scientific methods, with the aim of cultivating individuals with expertise capable of employing tactics for resolution and appropriate approaches. The study particularly improves the quality of social workers in facilities and communities, and offers a curriculum that takes into consideration gerontology research and the aged society that is characteristic of Okinawa Prefecture.

Clinical Psychology

The primary objective of Clinical Psychology is to cultivate specialists capable of concretely and practically handling the issues of the human mind from a position of expertise. To do so, a curriculum has been created that allows students to acquire a wealth of specialized knowledge based both on theory and practice that centers on subjects required for training clinical psychologists, and instruction is carried out that cultivates practical skills. The clinical psychology program has been designated a graduate school (Type 1) that possesses qualifications of candidacy for examination related to the qualifying exam for clinical psychologist that is carried out by the Foundation of the Japanese Certification Board for Clinical Psychologists. Becoming a Type 1 designated graduate school enables the acquisition of qualifications of candidacy for examination for the clinical psychologist exam, following completion of practical training during enrollment in the graduate school.

Graduate School of

Regional Business and Economics

Philosophy / Aims:

The university's philosophy is summarized by the key phrases "Peace and Coexistence," "Individuality and Creativity," and "Autonomy and Development." The Department of Regional Business and Economics in the Graduate School of Regional Business and Economics was opened in 1998 to exemplify this philosophy in higher dimensions in the areas of economics and commercial science. Specifically, in order to practically deal with issues directly faced by Okinawa Prefecture today in the promotion of industrial development, the school was established to form a base that combines the functions of human resources development and research to further encourage research activities founded on (1) the embodiment of expertise and complex knowledge in the real world to nurture high-quality expert professionals that can become the driving force in promoting local industry, and (2) organic relations with fields including economics, business administration, marketing, accounting, and information. Therefore, the aim of education is to nurture human resources that undertake the central roles in workplaces in corporations and administrations.

Department of Regional Business and Economics

Applied Econometrics

Applied Econometrics concentrates on researching applications for real society and analysis of economic/social information that utilizes various statistical analysis methods and econometric methods in order to provide and deepen analysis of rational information, and the ability to present grounds for decision-making (ability to analyze information) that is sought after in the workplace.

Okinawan Economics

Okinawan Economics focuses on theoretical and empirical research of the economy in Okinawa, which has a most unique history within Japan and a different socioeconomic structure. By taking up that research students learn economic analytic methods and economic reasoning skills.

Community Development

A community is an area enveloped in the social phenomena of having the same nature, or homogeneity. The target of that analysis does not end with Okinawa, but includes Asia and the world. Community development aims to scientifically analyze trends in society and the economy from a regional perspective, and with an understanding of those rules strengthen insight and practical skills.

Industrial Organization

Industrial Organization centers on theoretical, empirical, and policy-related research with the goal of providing and intensifying insight and practical skills related to changes in the socioeconomic system and trends in industrial organization.

Environmental Economics

Environmental Economics aims to investigate sustainable economic development that eases the tension between the environment and the economy—that is, the trade-off that arises when one is sacrificed to give priority to the other. To do so, students study assessment of environmental economic value, methods, basic theory, and investigations.

Regional Socio-Economic System

Today's socioeconomic system in Japan requires great change. This area of study aims to understand the regional society as a total system from the viewpoint of regional decentralization, regional supremacy, and regional autonomy in order to study the construction of a regional socioeconomic system.

Marketing

Marketing centers on the empirical research of local consumer trends and area marketing, and aims to teach and strengthen the knowledge and analytic skills needed to analyze the regional market from community and international perspectives.

Comparative Management

Comparative Management focuses on clarifying the characteristics of corporate management in Japan by comparatively analyzing characteristics in corporate management in various countries during technological innovation, and aims to develop and intensify analysis and insight skills related to corporate management from the perspective of human labor.

Tax Accounting

Tax Accounting is a field that researches the relationship between tax law (corporate tax law) and accounting (financial accounting). In particular, it references fundamental problems in tax accounting in the relationship between taxable income and business income, and its role and problems. There is also instruction offered that is related to accounting subjects (bookkeeping theory, financial statement accounting) that may be exempt from the tax accountant exam.

Graduate School of



Philosophy / Aims:

Today, globalization is advancing in many fields such as politics, economics, and society. Organized development in the 21st century no longer can be accomplished by a single nation. On the other hand, looking into the near future of our own country reveals a sense of stagnation in many areas (national finance, industry, labor issues, declining birth rate, pension, etc.). Given these circumstances, the role that universities (graduate schools) fulfill as institutes of intellectual creation is becoming more and more important. The Graduate School of Law aims to cultivate human resources that can demonstrate outstanding leadership in the chaos of modern times in order to fulfill a portion of that responsibility in the field of law.

Department of Law

Public Law / Basic Law

Public Law and Basic Law studies legal history and jurisprudence with the goal of instilling awareness of positive laws such as the Constitution, administrative law, and international law, as well as the ideological, historic, and social premises that form the basis of those positive laws.

Civil / Criminal Law

Civil and Criminal Law researches the substantive laws of civic law, commercial law, and criminal law, as well as the procedural laws of the Code of Civil Procedure and Criminal Procedure Code. Students systematically conduct research while comparing legal interpretations with precedents and doctrines both in Japan and abroad in order to make judicial solutions by applying modern law to specific cases.

International Exchange

Okinawa, open to the world as Japan's southern gateway, is a land full of nature and brimming with southern island hospitality, making it an ideal environment for international exchange where students and researchers from all over the world gather. OKIU has concluded exchange agreements with 13 overseas schools and enthusiastically accepts international students and sends students overseas. It carries out international exchange of students and teachers through various distinctive programs.





Widely recognized educational and research activities

At OKIU, various students and instructors participate in a wide range of international activities that promote peace and understanding in Okinawa and the world. These activities take place in many different countries and regions, both on and off campus, through the 4 colleges, graduate schools, 4 institutes, student circles, and the Center for Global Human Resource Development (CGHRD). OKIU offers special assistance to international students and Japanese students, and training courses based on high-quality specializations to international students from both the colleges and the graduate schools, as well as participates in research on Ryukyu studies that has gained international recognition on topics including longevity, peace and security, law, management, economy, environmental economics, information technology, and other interdisciplinary fields. The classes and research activities conducted at OKIU utilize the unique characteristics of Okinawa to include wide-reaching international implications. The success of those efforts can be seen in the accreditation granted to OKIU by the Japan Institution for Higher Education Evaluation.



An Environment with many advantages for students and researchers from around the globe

Located off of China, Okinawa is situated in the middle of the Ryukyu Islands between Kyushu and Taiwan. Over the centuries, Okinawa has been influenced by China, Korea, Japan, Southeast Asia, and the United States, giving rise to a culture that enjoys one-of-a-kind traditions and lifestyles. Found at the crossroads of East Asia, it is closer by air to Shanghai and Taipei than Tokyo, and can be easily accessed from many cities in the Asia-Pacific region and major cities on the Japanese mainland. Okinawa has a subtropical climate (yearly average temperature: 22°C/72°F) that led to the construction of resorts and convention facilities, and is surrounded by coral reefs and blue seas. The social and natural environments are perfect for conducting international research. The appealing academic and natural atmosphere makes it possible to create nurturing and supportive educational experiences that attract many researchers and students.

The CGHRD undertakes the task of conducting official exchanges between OKIU and partner universities, and offers a variety of services to international students enrolled in the university. Foreign language and cultural seminars

Held during summer break and spring break, participating students live either in university dormitories or with a host family for about 3 or 4 weeks. The chief objective is to offer training in foreign languages and experience of different cultures. The program offers classes in English, Chinese, Spanish, or Korean, lectures regarding regional culture, various extracurricular activities that bring insight into the region, and numerous exchange activities with local residents.

Japanese language and cultural study programs

Based on exchange agreements between OKIU and international partner University, approximately 30 students are accepted into Japanese language study and cultural training programs that last about 3 weeks. Through these unique programs, international students deepen their knowledge of Okinawa and the Japanese language. The experience also includes sightseeing and a variety of interaction with teachers and students.

International student support

Japanese Language Curriculum

Overview of Japanese Language Curriculum for Foreign Students

OKIU's Japanese language curriculum aims to train internationally minded professionals who will be able to contribute in the areas of international exchange and cooperation. Students in our program have utilized their newly acquired Japanese skills in a variety of ways: to enter our undergraduate or graduate programs, to enroll in other Japanese universities, to find work in Japan, or to work in Japan-related fields in their home countries.

Students studying Japanese at OKIU fall into one of the following categories:

(1) Regular Undergraduates:

These are foreign students who have passed the OKIU entrance examination and are enrolled in one of the ten departments of our four colleges. They take specialized and general classes along with Japanese students; however, they may feel the need to improve their Japanese in order to write reports or make presentations. All credits from advanced Japanese classes count towards graduation, and some departments accept credits from Japanese classes towards fulfilling the foreign language requirement. For these reasons, most foreign undergraduates decide to take some Japanese classes.

(3) Foreign Exchange Students:

OKIU has exchange agreements with 13 overseas partner universities. Students from these universities can study at OKIU on a one-year study program. These students take both undergraduate program and Japanese classes.

Summer Japanese Language and Culture Study Program

Students from overseas partner universities study Japanese language and culture for three weeks at OKIU in July. Each year, as many as thirty students participate in this program.

(2) Temporary International Students:

OKIU offers intermediate-level Japanese classes for temporary international students. Students in this category are expected to seek entrance to OKIU's undergraduate and graduate programs after completion. Students will have the opportunity to improve Japanese language skills for one year, and apply to undergraduate programs provided. To become a temporary international student applicants are required to submit an application and pass an interview in January. Applicants are also required to take the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students (EJU) or Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT), and must have their visa status as "Student" when they apply for this course. Applications from overseas are not acceptable.

(4) Other

Researchers from our overseas partner universities, scholars studying on the Fulbright Program, and others are allowed to study Japanese at OKIU when deemed necessary. We are also currently considering plans to open the door to those in the local community in need of Japanese study.

Minor in Teaching Japanese to Speakers of Other Languages

For students who hope to work as Japanese teachers in the future, OKIU's Department of Japanese Language and Culture and OKIU's Department of British and American Language and Culture both offer a minor course in Teaching Japanese to Speakers of Other Languages. Students can choose to do their practice teaching at OKIU, at Fujian Normal University (in China), at Tunghai University (in Taiwan), or at Panyapiwat institute of Management (in Thailand).

Entrance Examination Guide

Okinawa International University has an entrance examination system for prospective international students.

Special Entrance Examination for International Students (Pre-Arrival Admission System)

For concerned applicants who have a foreign nationality, have an outstanding academic record at a foreign upper secondary school, and have been recommended by the president of their alma mater or the Japanese language school the applicant is currently attending, we make a comprehensive decision based on applicant screening and test results from the Japanese Language Proficiency Test or from the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students.

1. Recommendation Criteria

- (1) Applicants with an outstanding academic record
- (2) Applicants with excellent character
- (3) Applicants with Japanese language ability



2. Application Qualifications

Applicants who possess a foreign nationality, who are at or above the age of 18 at the time of enrollment at Okinawa International University, who reside in a country other than Japan, and who correspond to points (1) – (8) as well as to points (9) and (10) below.

- (1) Applicants who have completed twelve years of schooling overseas or the equivalent. (In the case that the applicant has less than twelve years of schooling, the applicant may be required to complete further specified preparatory education courses or courses at a training facility.)
 - NOTE: "Applicants who have completed twelve years of schooling overseas or equivalent applicants" indicate applicants who "have completed their twelfth year of schooling in formal education." Please contact the respective embassy or consulate should there be anything unclear regarding completed formal education or the number of years of schooling.
 - "Equivalent applicants" are those applicants who have completed courses that correspond to foreign upper secondary schools that have been separately specified by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology (Date: March 31, 2016, Notification No.75 from the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology).
- (2) Applicants who have completed an international school that is designated as being equivalent to a foreign upper secondary school in Japan (in the case that the applicant has less than twelve years of schooling, the applicant may be required to complete further specified preparatory education courses).
- (3) Applicants who have completed curriculum at a certified educational institution abroad that is equivalent to an upper secondary school.
- (4) Applicants who have completed upper secondary school curriculum at a designated specialized training college.
- (5) Applicants who have completed twelve years of schooling at a foreign school accredited by an international assessment organization (WASC, CIS, ACSI).
 - NOTE: Applicants who have completed twelve years of schooling at a CIS Accredited school formerly known as ECIS are also qualified to apply.
- (6) Applicants who have passed a scholastic ability test equivalent to completing twelve years of schooling overseas (In the case that the applicant has less than twelve years of schooling, the applicant may be required to complete further specified preparatory education courses or courses at a training facility).
- NOTE: Please contact the respective embassy or consulate should there be anything unclear regarding the equivalency between passing a scholastic ability test and completed number of years of schooling.
- (7) Applicants who possess an admission qualification for a foreign university such as an International Baccalaureate, an Abitur or a Baccalaureate.
- (8) Applicants who are recognized by Okinawa International University for having qualifications equivalent to the points (1) (7) listed above
- (9) Applicants who intend to enroll or study and possess the residential qualification of "study abroad" as prescribed in *Immigration Control and Refugee Recognition Act* or applicants who are able to obtain said qualification by the time of admission.
- (10) Applicants who have taken the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students (EJU) or the Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT) (Applicants must have taken one of the two exams listed below.)

3. Selection Process

We make decisions on admission through applicant screening and examining test results from the Japanese Language Proficiency Test or from the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students. Although EJU includes questions from different subjects such as Japanese language proficiency, basic abilities in science, integrated studies, and mathematics, the university bases its consideration on the Japanese language proficiency score.

oreign Language Education

Helping students brush up their language stills while having fun

Nowadays, interacting with people from different cultures is unavoidable, so knowledge of foreign cultures and languages is essential. This is especially true for the younger generation. Language is the key for such interaction, and its acquisition is the most important element. At our university, we are focusing on the improvement of foreign language education that is essential in the era of globalization. As for our foreign language courses, we offer all of our students English, German, French, Chinese, Korean, and Spanish classes. In addition, we are working to further strengthen language skills by offering intensive courses and other courses.



A perfect environment for foreign language learning

In order to enhance the support system for foreign language learners, we have introduced the CALL system. CALL (Computer Assisted Language Learning) is a computerized language learning system that provides an optimal environment for individual learning and self-study, which are critical for foreign language learning. We have also started to offer LMS (Learning Management System) for off-campus learning. By using a variety of audio-visual teaching support mediums such as multi-media Internet contents, CD, MD, DVD, and VIDEO, and also communication devices like written, audio and video chats as well as bulletin boards, it is now possible for students to create a learning environment tailored to their own language level. After checking their attainment level, they are able to concentrate on strengthening their weaker areas, and learn at their own pace in an ideal environment for steadily improving their language skills. The CALL system is a powerful support system for anyone trying to learn a foreign language.

CALL classrooms

Our 4 CALL classrooms are equipped with a total of 204 computers (including 8 computers that support the visually impaired) for the purpose of learning foreign languages such as English, German, French, Chinese, Korean, Spanish, and Japanese. Students can take structured lessons or use the educational materials at their own pace for self-study, making it very convenient for language learning.

Language Library

Students can use the language library in order to further extend their skills in the foreign language they have learned in class. Whenever students like, they can get a better understanding of the language and culture of a foreign country either by themselves or in groups by watching movies in the foreign language they are learning, and using a variety of media materials.

CALL Teaching Materials Creation Lab

The CALL Teaching Materials Creation Lab (known as the MERMAID Lab) helps teachers carry out research and development projects involving multimedia teaching materials. The creation of the original multimedia teaching materials for various languages including English, German, French, Chinese, Korean, and others, aims at improving the quality of classroom study.



nformation Technology Education

Helping students acquire the comprehensive knowledge that will help them cope with today's information-oriented society

Recent years have seen remarkable advances in information technology, and those transformations are rapidly progressing. Not only basic knowledge of information technology, but also the knowledge and techniques to apply those skills have become indispensable. Okinawa International University provides the latest equipment and the best computer education to create individuals who can flexibly handle today's information-oriented society. We are committed to traning professionals who can cope with this information-oriented society based on accurate knowledge and strong morals through a command of information technologies in all fields.



Providing various information-related classes for all students

Modern times, when anyone can use computers and other information devices, require a comprehensive knowledge of how to utilize information. Therefore, this university has a wide range of computer facilities and has created several information-related general subjects so that all students can acquire computer skills. Furthermore, specialized subjects give students practical study through the execution of application-related education, including techniques for utilizing the Internet, word processing, and spreadsheets, as well as programming such as numeric calculation and basic patterns for economic/administrative data processing. The College of Global and Regional Culture also offers classes for all students that show them how to operate information-processing equipment. Moreover, students study the application of computer technology in collecting materials for special classes and research presentations.



Supporting information education with an array of equipment

To stay current with today's ever-evolving information-oriented society, Okinawa International University spares no effort in our support of students in the areas of information devices and relevant campus facilities. There are 14 classrooms, large and small, for information education with approximately 700 computer terminals on the 1F and 2F of Building 5 and the 4F of Building 13. These facilities are utilized for practical training in information-related education and can be used by students anytime when not occupied by classes. The computers in the computer labs are on a local area network (LAN) with the computers in faculty offices, the library, and administrative offices. Also, a wireless LAN equipped with a solid security system can be used throughout campus, so mobile terminals such as personal laptops can be connected if security requirements are met. Using these terminals allows students to take advantage of a variety of services, including information searches and email both on and off campus.



egional Studies

Aiming to create a university that serves the region

One of the goals of Okinawa International University is to create a university that serves the region. To accomplish this, a variety of phenomena are being researched through the university's Integrated Research Organization comprised of 4 institutes that develop the geographic and social landscape of Okinawa, and return those research outcomes to the region. In addition, lectures are held on campus for prefectural residents in an effort to build a university that is truly rooted in the region.



Institute of Ryukyuan Culture

The Institute of Ryukyuan Culture was established in April 1978 as a place to conduct joint interdisciplinary research. With the objective of contributing to the development of academic research on islands in the Ryukyu arc, each year a region from among the Amami Islands, Okinawa Islands, Miyako Islands, and Yaeyama Islands is specified for general study. Excursions have also been made to Taiwan, Korea, and Fujian Province in China, to conduct comparative studies on each culture. Exchange among researchers continues. The Institute also collects valuable literature and documents, organizes and preserves them, and shares them with students and the general public. In addition to the journal, Nanto Bunka (Southern Island Culture). the Institute publishes a yearly report that compiles the results of the general studies noted above. The Institute also works with local newspapers to hold public lectures on southern island culture in cities such as Naha, Ginowan, Ishigaki, Okinawa, and Nishihara. With students, instructors tour various areas in the prefecture to study history, culture, nature, and geography. Other research and report activities continue, such as the Shima workshop, Southern Island Research Seminars, and lecture meetings on survey reports.

Okinawa Institute of Law and Politics

The Okinawa Institute of Law and Politics was established in 1997 at the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of Okinawa International University, and the Okinawa Reversion. The modern history of Okinawa has been very different from the mainland Japan's. These differences are still exerting great influence on contemporary Okinawa. In particular, Okinawa had been under the United States administrative rule until the Reversion to Japan in 1972. Even after the Reversion, a large portion of the US military bases in Japan is concentrated on Okinawa and their status is virtually beyond Japanese legal system.

This condition results in numerous problems that are legal, political and often international in nature. We conduct academic researches into these problems, and the results of the researches are published in forms of timely symposia, Institute's lecture series, our own yearly academic journal Okinawa Journal of Law and Politics, and publication of Joint Research Report Series Okinawa Institute of Law and Politics

Institute of General Industrial Research

The Institute of General Industrial Research was established in April 1991 with the aim of conducting theoretical and empirical research from international and comprehensive perspectives in order to contribute to the advancement of scholarship and development of industrial society. In addition to the staff (university instructors), the Institute employs individuals as special researchers from the industrial and economic spheres, government, and experts from universities and institutes within Japan and abroad. While viewing the self-sustaining development of industry and economy in Okinawa Prefecture, which possesses geographic, historic, and cultural attributes, the Institute is striving to build broad information networks and various research personnel from industry, government, and academia that reach beyond regional borders to promote joint academic research on an international level. As the only facility in Okinawa that carries out comprehensive industrial research, the Institute is proud to take on unique goals and roles, and is working to become a facility that can contribute to the promotion of the regional industrial society through joint global research in which various researchers openly participate.

Okinawa Institute of Economics and Environmental Studies

The Okinawa Institute of Economics and Environmental Studies was established in April 2009. In the field of islands called Okinawa, the Institute conducts joint research on the economy and environment from international and interdisciplinary perspectives, and aims to both develop research studies and share the outcomes with regional residents. Okinawa has cultivated a variety of knowhow in the generation that has passed in the 40 years since Okinawa's return. Following the return, strategic industries such as tourism and the tourist industry have particularly taken on a significant role. However, economic disparity with the mainland and a high rate of unemployment have yet to be eliminated, and numerous problems exist including global environmental issues and environmental destruction that accompanies large-scale regional development, the disadvantages of islands, and drawbacks due to the existence of American military bases. In other words, the building of a sustainable society that balances both preservation of the natural environment and economic development is sought after. The Institute forms networks among industry, government, and academia, and implements symposiums, lecture meetings, and workshops with the aim of broadly contributing to the regional society.



A treasure trove of approximately 450,000 documents

As the brain and heart of Okinawa International University, the library is both a beautifully and culturally dignified building appropriate to a symbol of intellectual vitality. It strives to offer library services that adapt to a diversified media. The library houses approximately 450,000 publications, offering students who use the library a fulfilling campus life, and increasing the amount of learning and research. In addition to a wealth of documents, the library also has a support system that includes an enhanced environment and services.

Library features

The university library is equipped with various functions to support education and research at the university, and is an easy-to-use facility open to the public.

The open ceiling space that extends from the entrance hall makes the layout easy to understand, and there are reading spaces and different zones that take into account the flow of traffic. There are various accommodations that include comfortable seats for reading, individual seating for privacy, single-occupancy research rooms with computers, and rooms for group study.

To curb the impact of solar radiation, the exterior walls are enclosed with louvers, and the roof is planted with vegetation to increase insulation effectiveness. Inside, there is a ventilation system that uses both ordinary ventilation and floor cooling to provide a comfortable reading environment.

The AV/PC area is equipped with computers, CDs, LDs, DVDs, and videos, and visitors can surf the Internet on computers to gather information. The AV/multipurpose hall can be utilized for events such as lecture meetings, video showings, and workshops. In addition, the studio/editing room has editing equipment for processing video and sound to assist with multimedia education that includes creating teaching materials and editing.







Library Guidance

Each year the library holds library guidance for university and graduate students. This guidance teaches students how to search for documents necessary to write graduate theses, master's theses, reports, research, and and how to effectively and conveniently search for information. Many documents are published electronically with the advancement of computerization and exist on networks. To efficiently proceed with research and studies, it is necessary to gather information not only from traditional library documents. DVDs, videos, and CDs, but also from electronic media. Students should take advantage of the guidance and learn how to gather information to efficiently utilize the hybrid library that merges traditional media with new media.

Career Support

Comprehensive support to help students get on their career paths

The Career Support Center carries out a variety of initiatives including job search guidance, job search workshops by university graduates, job search consultations, mock interviews, resume revision, and lectures on various examinations for occupations such as civil servant and teacher, and general corporate exams. In addition, the employment reference room makes it possible to immediately gather employment information on hiring, corporations, and the civil service examination, and students can use the available computers to view the job search system and Internet. The Career Support Center staff does their best to help students form a solid sense of purpose and conduct satisfactory job-hunting activities.



Types of Support



Explanatory meetings about employment for various companies, types of national public officials, and employment examinations for teachers are held on campus.

Job search consultations provided by a career counselor

In addition to job search consultations given by staff at the Career Support Center, every Tuesday and Wednesday career counselors offer counseling on career paths, mock interviews, and revisions of resumes and application forms.

Internships

Internships at businesses and government offices are offered during the summer break. The hands-on learning not only aids in choosing a place of employment, but also leads to confidence in job search activities, and can be beneficial in the job hunt. Overseas internships are also offered to nurture broad-minded perspectives and international sensibilities.

The Live Campus Job Search System

The Live Campus Job Search System makes it possible to search for employment information, job search events on and off campus, and corporate seminar schedules. It also links to the Internet and various job search navigation systems, and can be utilized to sign up for company explanatory meetings as well as to gather the latest employment information. Those who wish can also sign up for email updates on job information.

An informative Employment Reference Room

The reference room is filled with employment notices from corporations inside and outside the prefecture, individual corporate files, job hunting magazines, and documents regarding requirements for civil service exams, requirements for enrollment in graduate schools, and other job-related information. Students are encouraged to make good use of them to find good jobs.

Practice examinations for employment and various aptitude tests

The center conducts mock exams for companies civil service, and other aptitude tests.

Subsidies for job search activities outside the prefecture

A portion of travel expenses, etc. are subsidized when job search activities are conducted outside of the prefecture.



Student supporter system

For many students, the job hunt is a first-time experience and there is anxiety and concern. Students can eliminate that worry by talking with former students who have very recently finished their own job search activities.

Scholarships / Financial Assistance

Students at OKIU are provided with financial assistance through two major sources: loans offered by the Japan Student Services Organization(JASSO) and scholarships offered by OKIU. Our scholarships do not require repayment, and we do our best to support students who are struggling financially.

Okinawa University and International University, private universities located in Okinawa, have decided to merge and establish a new university, based on agreement between the parties. As private universities, both naturally possess unique philosophies of establishment in accordance with their founders. They also have concepts for executing those philosophies, and their own irreplaceable histories and traditions of value. However, while the unique rationales of both Okinawa University and International University to exist as private universities and their traditions will be respected, from today the decision has been made to reexamine the issue of being " a private university in Okinawa" from an even broader perspective.

Prior to WWII, not a single university or technical college was established in Okinawa. After the war, the two private universities were created amid an unusual social environment of military administration by a different race—as it were, the universities were built from nothing through strenuous efforts. No matter the extent to which both universities have contributed to local society, or how they are viewed for having fulfilled their roles, there is a need to establish a university that will be the top educational institution in Okinawa, and the insight and endeavors of the founders in earnestly responding to the need for institutions of higher learning,

especially the hope for private universities, deserves to be afforded the highest praise.

However, since establishment it has become clear that smoothly managing a private university while constantly maintaining the highest standards of education and research is far from an easy task. A glance at the considerable debt, personnel composition, and facilities of the two universities clearly reveals the difficulty of facing a series of hardships, both moral and material.

These problems, though, are not merely the result of careless management or lack of effort in filling faculty posts and upgrading facilities. Post-war Okinawa has led a troubled history fettered with numerous burdens, and private universities in Okinawa have had to follow the same path. Our current problems are of the same nature as those of post-war Okinawa society, which has reached the critical limit of the autonomous efforts of its citizens

Consequently, our problems are of a fundamentally different nature than problems that might be pointed out in light of the Standards for the Establishment of Universities based on Japanese law, which has been much speculated about with the reversion of Okinawa to Japan, or of complaints that we fail to measure up to universities on the mainland. It would be inappropriate to attempt to grasp our problems only by

applying these so-called establishment standards. Nevertheless, we can by no means ignore our problems, regardless of their cause. As for the above-mentioned critical limit, we have been vigilantly mindful of our problems as we conduct the daily tasks of research and education and have unwaveringly been determined to conquer them, but the accumulated years of effort have now reached an impasse.

Recognizing this awareness and perspective, concerned parties from both universities have reached the mutual understanding that they share the same problems and the same means for overcoming them, and have decided to cooperate in reformulating the role of the private university in Okinawa.

Accordingly, Okinawa University and International University firmly believe that the so-called identities of the two universities, which have been fostered separately in Okinawa, can be partially preserved in a new integrated identity while mutually respecting the intents and purposes of each founder and the traditions of each university. In fact, creating a private university in the Okinawan community that possesses such a strong sense of identity is the obligation of both parties

Okinawa's return to Japan in 1972 means that private universities in Okinawa have to compete with several hundred Japanese universities, but we should steadfastly adhere to our identity as a private Okinawan university, and extend our

self-assertiveness to all of Japanese society. This struggle is of the same nature as Okinawa's fight for true freedom and political autonomy constantly called for and sought after by citizens and society over the last quarter of a century that comprises modern Okinawa history.

In taking this position, we are appealing to the general public and earnestly hoping for its understanding and cooperation, for we know that the newly planned university cannot survive without the broad support and sympathy of the local community

Fortunately, all groundwork in connection with the organization and management of the new university is currently nearing completion. In addition, the Japanese government has, in compliance with the wishes of the concerned parties, firmly committed itself to providing funds for this new university that has been conceived through our hard work.

We have hereby expressed our aspirations and the course of events leading to the establishment of a new university through the merger of Okinawa University and International University. We turn to all concerned for their encouragement and assistance.


